### STUDY SUPPORT

In addition to that given by the individual teaching staff, a wide range of additional support is provided by the Academy.

Homework is a key element in the process of learning. It ensures that pupils achieve a deeper understanding of the concepts, knowledge and skills taught during classes and the importance of committing time to this cannot be overemphasised. The Homework Policy ensures that pupils are not overburdened and allows them to plan and spread the work.

A Pupil Learning Planner is provided for all pupils; this allows them to record learning targets, homework, test or examination dates and plan revision. It is also a diary in which they can enter trips, clubs, events, etc.

Study clubs and revision sessions are arranged during lunchtimes and after school by many departments; these are particularly useful in the run-up to important examinations. Please see What's on Guide in Parents' Area and Pupils' Area.

#### LIBRARY

The School Library plays a very important role in providing additional support and learning resources for all pupils as well as cooperating in the delivery of subject coursework. It provides opportunities for pupils to meet with and hear from writers and supports senior pupils as they prepare for the transition to Higher Education.

As well as a fully resourced computer suite, the Library also houses a teaching area and provides links to many other information sources. The Library team is always looking at ways to expand and extend the service offered and provides pupils with the opportunity to play an active role in its management; it is available to pupils before and after the school day, and at break and lunchtime, for both academic work and personal leisure pursuits.

The Library hosts clubs and events, presents displays of new stock and has a stationery shop, run by the Senior Library Committee, where pupils can buy basic items such as pens, pencils, erasers, rulers, folders, notebooks, highlighters, corrector mice and plastic wallets at reasonable prices.

It provides specific internet links which suggest reading ideas for pupils, guides to Personal Study reading for senior pupils and gateways to subject based research. Links are available to news services, on-line databases and the Aberdeen University library catalogue and staff are on hand to help with references and bibliographies.

### WIDER CURRICULUM

To promote the development of fully rounded individuals, Turriff Academy balances and enhances the 'academic' curriculum with a broad range of opportunities, initiatives and strategies which have the potential to impact on all aspects of pupils' future life. All S5 and S6 pupils take part in Leadership periods as part of our school's Leadership and Responsibility Programme.

Encouraging a healthy lifestyle, realising potential in working life, appreciating differences and cultural diversity, developing personal and social responsibility, and motivating every member of the school community to achieve their maximum are fostered by extra-curricular opportunities, curricular and extra-curricular trips and visits, field trips, visiting speakers, presenters and performers and local and national initiatives.

### **ENTERPRISE IN EDUCATION**

 Supported by Learning and Teaching Scotland, "Enterprise in Education" aims to see business and schools working together. Their shared ambition is to change young people's attitudes to work and to life. Enterprise in education will equip children and young people with the skills and values to contribute meaningfully to the Scottish economy and society and will prepare them for the role of global citizens of the twenty-first century. It can be broadly defined as:

- opportunities to think and act in enterprising ways across the curriculum
- an emphasis on core skills and the ability to transfer these to different contexts
- learning and teaching which encourages positive attitudes and develops skills such as problem solving, decision making, creativity and risk evaluating
- entrepreneurial experience
- career education which promotes knowledge and understanding of the world of work and includes a focus on work experience
- development of a culture of lifelong learning.
- Enterprise is also one of the key components of the National Priorities for education; National priority 5 Learning and Life, states its intention:
- To equip pupils with the foundation skills, attitudes and expectations necessary to prosper in a changing society to encourage creativity and ambition.

As well as this clear link between enterprise and education and national priority number 5, it is also relevant to and makes important contributions towards all the National priorities in education in Scotland.

## **ENTERPRISE AT TURRIFF ACADEMY**

Turriff Academy seeks to implement the national agenda in a way which supports the community of which it is a part. Local objectives are also taken into consideration to ensure that a profitable relationship can evolve and be sustained between the school and outside interested parties.
