

Why Modern Studies?

Modern Studies examines the society we live in. You will learn about democracy, social issues, international issues and how people view the government. You will develop important skills such as decision making, investigation, critical thinking and forming your own opinions.

Course Outline.

Modern Studies helps to develop your knowledge and understanding of social, political and economic issues. You will learn about the political and social issues that affect us in Scotland, the UK and internationally. You will find out some of the ways societies deal with conflict, and learn about human rights and responsibilities.

The course has three compulsory units, plus an added value unit to assess your practical skills.

Modern Studies: Politics in Scotland In this unit you will:



- use sources of information to detect and explain examples of bias and exaggeration
- develop your knowledge and understanding of democracy in

- learn about the ways people are able to participate in and influence the political system
- learn about your rights and responsibilities in a democratic political society.
